Featured Note: NSF Funds Study of Historical Human-Fire Interactions

Thomas Swetnam, Christopher Roos, T.J. Ferguson, Matthew Liebmann, Rachel Loehman, Robert Keane, and Sara Chavarria have been awarded a National Science Foundation (NSF) grant of nearly \$1.5 million over three years to pursue research of historical human interactions with fire and climate in the Southwest.

Through historical case study, they will test hypotheses of how human activities at the Wildland Urban Interface (WUI) affect response of fire-adapted forests to climate change and how humans respond to these changes. Large communities of Native American farmers lived within ponderosa pine forests through varying climatic episodes and this history may offer ways to deal with current issues.

Fire/Fuel Modeling

Workshops- Attend a series of classroom modules in one of several locations, such as Tucson, Phoenix, Prescott, or Flagstaff in Arizona, and Albuquerque, Taos or Alamogordo in New Mexico. Modules include instruction on: FlamMap, FRCC, Landfire, and Archaeology and paleoecology will be combined to build multi-century fire and forest histories. Integrated research with American Indian tribal partners will contextualize the fire and forest histories and human responses to environmental changes. Findings from this research will promote the understanding of long-term landscape-scale dynamics of human societies, forests, and climate, which is necessary for sustainable management of similar forests across the west.

In addition to the research, the group plans to develop a local educational program with K-12 lesson plans that integrate fire and society issues in science and history classrooms.

"I grew up around archaeology and went to school with pueblo kids," Swetnam said. "It's a dream project for me. ... I hope this project will help me learn some social sciences and learn something from my former classmates and childhood friends."
