Wildfire by choice: The Egypt Fire by Jeffrey Thumm, USFS Fire Management Specialist and Shaula Hedwall, USFWS Senior Fish and Wildlife Biologist

The Egypt fire started as a result of a lightning strike in the West Clear Creek Wilderness on the Coconino National Forest on July 15, 2013. Given that it was monsoon season, the wilderness location, and existing heavy fuel loadings, the Forest Service decided to manage the fire to meet resource objectives. Initially, the fire had a hard time gaining much ground due to large amounts of precipitation that fell during the first few weeks following the fire. However, the fire was allowed

to "simmer" for several weeks before things began to dry out and the fire could consume fuel. The fire burned for approximately two months with most acreage burned over just a few days in early August. Fire behavior and severity were low for the majority of the acreage that burned. Higher severity fire effects were associated with jackpots of heavy fuel. Overall fire effects included reduced dead and down fuels, raised tree crown heights, and aided in improving the area's overall resiliency to the effects of wildfire burning under extreme conditions. In addition to managing this fire, Coconino National Forest Fire staff also ensured that monitoring information was collected regarding fire effects. This information is critical to future managed fires, determining effects to wildlife and habitat, and improving resource benefit objectives.
